3	MR. SZABO: We've been
4	trying to set up this meeting
5	with, I think, primarily Jared but
6	obviously, you know, everyone is
7	welcome to discuss some of the
8	issues with the State of the
9	Aquifer Report and the draft and
10	some concerns related to
11	public-private engagement and also
12	the groundwater resource
13	management plan in 2017.
14	Steve Colabufo has been
15	shepherding this through. Do you
16	want to start with any particular
17	insight?
18	MR. COLABUFO: Well,
19	regarding the State of the Aquifer
20	Report, it's 99.99 percent done.
21	There's just a few typographical
22	errors which I had hoped to have
23	corrected by now, but the
24	gentleman from Horizon Concepts,

they had a problem internally,

2	server crash, whatever, and took
3	about three weeks to get the
4	latest, and I had suggested
5	corrections. He didn't make them
6	all, so what we've got out there
7	is complete in terms of content,
8	but there's one or two
9	typographical errors, and it's
10	really stylistic things that I've
11	noticed.
12	I did incorporate all the
13	comments virtually all the
14	comments I received into the
15	report in some fashion. There was
16	a couple of comments that were
17	maybe points of disagreement that
18	I didn't incorporate in there, so
19	there's still room on that, but
20	it's essentially complete.
21	Contentwise I've got Walt
22	from the health department to get
23	me two sections: One on
24	pesticides, one on sea level rise,
25	and so contentwise I believe it's

2	done. There may still be some
3	extraneous issues which have to be
4	spoken about here. That's it, in
5	a nutshell.
6	MR. SZABO: Is there
7	anything in particular related to
8	the content that we want to
9	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: Are we
10	talking about P3 or are we talking
11	about the report?
12	MR. SZABO: P3.
13	MR. HERSHKOWITZ:
14	(Inaudible) is the next section.
15	MR. SZABO: I thought this
16	was a meeting to discuss both
17	those things that you had issues
18	with, both the State of the
19	Aquifer Report content as well
20	as
21	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: That's
22	not what I was told. I thought
23	this was a P3 committee meeting.
24	MR. SZABO: Let's go with
25	Р3.

2	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: We can
3	talk about that at the LICAP
4	meeting. That was part of the
5	agenda. Let's not waste time with
6	that. Do we all agree with that?
7	MR. SZABO: Sure.
8	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: P3 was
9	submitted in February the last
10	time I submitted was February.
11	From February until Steve
12	contacted me in July there were no
13	comments, no references. We had a
14	meeting. As a result of that I
15	accepted some criticism and
16	rejected some others. We had a
17	really good meeting.
18	MR. SZABO: Is this the
19	meeting at Dvirka Bartilucci?
20	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: Yeah,
21	that was the last one, and Gerry
22	was there, and unfortunately Karen
23	wasn't. We obviously the
24	dispute let me step back,
25	because I think a little history

2	is a positive.
3	P3 has always received, for
4	the most part, positive response
5	from people. I received extensive
6	e-mail from Stan Carey, extensive
7	from Tony, Karen, Gerry.
8	MR. MEYLAND: We talk.
9	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: We talk
10	all the time.
11	A lot of P3 has always
12	received positive reinforcement,
13	particularly 1 through 6 and 1
14	through 7.
15	When we got to the business
16	side, you and I had conversations
17	about it, and we talked about how
18	P3 would be implemented, that
19	seems to be and that was
20	obviously Tony's concern.
21	Although Tony represented DEC, he
22	liked most of P3. He liked it.
23	Stan, as head of the Water
24	Supplier Association, liked a lot
25	of P3, and so it was

3	about
4	MR. HERSHKOWITZ:
5	confusing.
6	MR. SZABO: Can I interrupt
7	a minute?
8	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: Yeah.
9	MR. SZABO: You're talking
10	about the three-page or four-page
11	draft that you submitted?
12	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: Yeah. I
13	use the acronym so I could get a
14	handle on it. I said it from the
15	very beginning. This was only to
16	spur conversation and hopefully
17	for this thing to grow into a
18	full-fledged plan. I never
19	represented this as a complete
20	thing.
21	MR. SZABO: Right.
22	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: We need
23	to go over the finance, and we
24	needed to go and the biggest
25	problem was how to implement it.

2	What I'm trying to tell the group
3	here is P3 has always had support
4	from most of the members of LICAP
5	that responded, okay, all of the
6	members.
7	MR. SZABO: I don't think
8	that's a question.
9	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: Yeah.
10	MS. BLUMER: I thought we
11	were supposed to be focusing on
12	number 10, the recommendations.
13	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: I'm
14	getting there. I'm just reviewing
15	that we all agree somehow that
16	aspects of P3 or a good chunk of
17	P3 or all of P3 or whatever, we
18	were going to look at, and I think
19	you said, Jeff, this might be
20	moved you know, when we get to
21	March, this might be moved to the
22	recommendation section, might be
23	its own thing. We didn't know. I
24	was looking forward to this
25	meeting.

2	As we continue to flesh out
3	P3, and I'm going to represent
4	this clearly, to me P3 is the only
5	plan that I'm going to use the
6	word attacks the problems of
7	contaminants in our drinking,
8	surface and coastal waters, for
9	the most part across the board, at
10	the source, not as a reactive to
11	contamination but as a preventive
12	to contamination, and I always
13	represented that this is a
14	long-term plan, a 20-year plan.
15	As a matter of fact, if you
16	look at County Executive Bellone's
17	plan, some aspects of it were
18	included in P3 two years ago, and
19	those were rebates and incentives
20	to change over the septic systems
21	in 360,000 homes to
22	nitrogen-reducing systems, and I
23	even made the statement two years
24	ago that the State of Maryland had
25	done what we are doing in Suffolk

2	County in 2007, but it was still
3	positive that we did it for two
4	reasons.
5	Number one, the technology
6	has gotten better, and we needed
7	to relook at some of the newer
8	technologies, and what Mr. Bellone
9	was doing was obviously very
10	positive.
11	And number two, the most
12	important aspect, is that the
13	proposal brought to the public eye
14	the imperative that we need to
15	take action, so I I look at P3,
16	and I'm very proud of it in that
17	maybe it had some influence,
18	whatever, it doesn't really
19	matter. Those of you who know me
20	know that ego is not part of this.
21	I've been asked to run for office
22	many times. I've turned it down.
23	That's not me.
24	I don't speak to the
25	newspapers. I don't speak to

2	Channel 12. Danielle Campbell
3	came to me the other day. I don't
4	want to be on camera. That's not
5	my purpose, okay. My purpose,
6	like any activist, is personal.
7	When I had prostate cancer,
8	did I look at why I had it? Was
9	it possible that I grew up on Long
10	Island and was drinking with water
11	with nitrogen in it and didn't do
12	anything about it. (Inaudible) is
13	it a link? They don't know.
14	Whatever it is.
15	My friends with breast
16	cancer or pancreatic cancer or
17	illnesses or asthma or we even
18	have autism listed in our plan
19	our report. These are linkages.
20	There's no proofs. I understand
21	that.
22	MR. SZABO: Let's get
23	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: But
24	what
25	MR. SZABO: back to P3.

3	MR. SZABO: What you're
4	looking for is a revision to the
5	draft to include in the State of
6	Aquifer Report?
7	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: No, no.
8	This has to be part of the
9	management.
10	MR. SZABO: Okay. The 2017
11	ground water plan
12	MR. COLABUFO: One of the
13	reports within it.
14	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: Do you
15	believe
16	MR. COLABUFO: I believe
17	there should be a section on
18	education and public-private
19	partnerships.
20	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: Or at
21	least talked about in the report.
22	MR. COLABUFO: One of the
23	chapters of the ground water
24	management plan, the idea of
25	getting the public, the general

2	public, greater involved in their
3	water supply.
4	MR. SZABO: That's part of
5	that report.
6	MR. COLABUFO: I think the
7	way the report is written is maybe
8	a point of disagreement.
9	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: I said I
10	was totally open.
11	MR. BLUMER: Do you have a
12	copy of the way it's written?
13	MR. COLABUFO: It's all
14	prototype right now. It's all
15	putty that we're molding.
16	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: This is
17	the last revision from me. This
18	is a revision that Steve did.
19	MR. COLABUFO: Let's call
20	it a prototype. It's not a
21	revision of anything. It's a
22	creation.
23	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: We're in
24	discussion mode. That's what
25	committees are for.

2	MR. SZABO: I don't really
3	think there's opposition from
4	anybody that P3 should be part of
5	the ground water management plan.
6	I think if there was some
7	discussion it was related to in
8	this draft we got from you, there
9	was a lot of tax this, go after
10	that business, implement this,
11	implement that, and when, I think,
12	some of us look at P3s and look at
13	dealing forming partnerships
14	and collaborating working with
15	businesses and engaging the public
16	overall, it's a little bit more
17	broad than just the idea of tax,
18	let them pay for this, you know,
19	and I think that was our concern.
20	That we need to we had
21	plenty we have time. Let's
22	take a step back and, sort of,
23	pull together people who can
24	contribute to this discussion and
25	put together something that's a

2	little bit more broad based.
3	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: I said
4	that from the beginning.
5	MR. KOCH: I agree.
6	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: But we
7	waited eight months to start
8	really talking about this.
9	MR. SZABO: Have you called
10	a meeting?
11	MS. BLUMER: Excuse me, I
12	thought that we were here
13	specifically to discuss yeah,
14	you know, some of our suggestions,
15	I personally think they are
16	limited, and I haven't had time to
17	send more comments to Jared, I'm
18	sorry, but this number 10 that you
19	were objecting, you know,
20	leadership, to us putting in a
21	management approach being an
22	entity, and that's why we're here
23	to discuss this. We'd like to
24	keep that in.
25	MR. SZABO: In what?

2	MR. KOCH: As a
3	recommendation at the end of P3?
4	MS. BLUMER: Yeah.
5	MR. COLABUFO: If you're
6	going to do we're jumping here,
7	but that's fine. If you're going
8	to do P3, included in a P3
9	proposal needs to be a mechanism
10	to make this happen, so I I use
11	the concept of the Long Island
12	Aquifer Recovery Act, which we
13	discussed, and you and I differed
14	in our vision as to whether we
15	should be telling the legislators
16	what to do, we should be offering
17	my vision, we should be offering
18	choices for them to do, and I
19	don't want to represent what you
20	said, but my impression was that
21	that's not what we should be
22	doing. We should be putting out
23	these things and let them decide
24	how to do it.
25	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: I think

2	the first thing is let's
3	identify
4	MR. COLABUFO: The
5	management plan is an
6	identification of action, which
7	you and I agreed with a hundred
8	percent.
9	MR. SZABO: Identify State
10	of the Aquifer, identify, do that,
11	groundwater
12	MR. COLABUFO: Now we're on
13	a plan.
14	MR. SZABO: Exactly, and
15	one of the resolve clause that
16	made clear, and I hope to clear up
17	that misconception at the health
18	community, and I think there's
19	been a lot of misinterpretation
20	out of resolve clause and whereas
21	clause, it does say management
22	opportunities. That can be
23	that's so broad based. It could
24	be anything, so I think that works
25	to our advantage

2	MS. BLUMER: Legislator
3	Spencer was very clear. We have a
4	crisis. We're appointing you to
5	do (inaudible) solution. Action.
6	He was big on action, and I mean,
7	he gave you a personal, what did
8	he call it, personal warning or
9	caution.
10	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: Charge.
11	MR. SZABO: I don't know if
12	there was a warning.
13	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: Watch the
14	videotape. It was a charge.
15	MS. BLUMER: Personal
16	caution, that's what he said.
17	It's right on the tape. We
18	watched the tape. That, you know,
19	and he said it very clear, kind of
20	jokingly, but we got the point.
21	MR. KOCH: I didn't hear
22	him say create a management group.
23	I heard him say definite
24	recommendations. That's what I
25	heard.

2	MS. BLUMER: No, no, no,
3	action.
4	MR. KOCH: He said, I want
5	to see defined recommendations
6	coming out of the plan.
7	MS. BLUMER: More than once
8	he said actions.
9	MR. MILAZZO: Okay, okay.
10	You have the tape. We'll go to
11	the videotape.
12	What do we have on the
13	agenda for today's meeting?
14	Number six, isn't that definitive
15	action by LICAP to discuss future
16	management opportunities? Isn't
17	that what you're all asking for?
18	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: Well,
19	for let me separate
20	MR. MILAZZO: Because I
21	want to be sure I understand.
22	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: P3, I've
23	been is asking we've all had
24	discussions, how does this get
25	implemented? We can't do a

2	wholistic attack in a piecemeal
3	way. That's what we've been doing
4	for 50 years, so if we're going to
5	look at P3, and I agree with Jeff,
6	P3 needs to be fleshed out, the
7	finances behind it, exactly
8	what you know, but we can put
9	generalities in a P3 plan and let
10	the legislators flesh that out or
11	we can spend time now and March
12	fleshing it out, but there needs
13	to be, at least for me, a
14	recommendation for a mechanism for
15	implementation.
16	My recognition was the end.
17	You know, we care very strongly
18	about that. As a matter of fact,
19	I differ with them. I think we
20	need a regional entity, including
21	Brooklyn and Queens, because,
22	after all, the aquifer knows no
23	geographical bounds.
24	MS. BLUMER: Ed Romaine
25	agrees with you.

2	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: I know he
3	agrees with me. I agree with him
4	on a lot of things, but the point
5	is, if we're going to do a P3
6	section in the management plan
7	there needs to be some methodology
8	offered. There could be many
9	different methodologies offered to
10	implement the plan.
11	Now, what I said to Steve
12	and I will say publically Steve
13	and I had a private meeting, which
14	I was really uncomfortable with,
15	but we decided to do it because I
16	love Steve was that I'm open,
17	okay, to removing it provided in
18	the management plan there are
19	entity choices listed, because
20	then we're duplicating things, but
21	if we can form the committee to
22	explore management
23	opportunities
24	MR. KOCH: Has anybody
25	asked Jared to remove number 10

3	MR. KOCH: from the
4	report?
5	MS. BLUMER: You have
6	asked.
7	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: At the
8	last meeting I think Jeffrey
9	asked.
10	MR. KOCH: I don't think
11	anybody asked.
12	MR. MILAZZO: I don't
13	remember asking you both.
14	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: What was
15	that?
16	MR. KOCH: I'll be honest,
17	I think the groundwater plan,
18	which still hasn't 2017 is
19	going to include your report, and
20	you talk wholistic, we're going to
21	have wholistic recommendations,
22	and that very well may be one of
23	the recommendations, your one
24	report your half of one report
25	for P3. There's another public

2	education part. We've got to get
3	that all together yet.
4	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: I would
5	agree.
6	MR. SZABO: Call have
7	you called a committee meeting?
8	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: No. Bill
9	was supposed to Bill was head
10	of my group. Bill calls the
11	meeting.
12	MR. SZABO: Call a meeting.
13	We will open it up to others.
14	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: I started
15	calling Bill. There was no
16	response, because Bill seems to
17	have been, kind of, lost.
18	MR. COLABUFO: He started
19	having
20	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: I
21	apologize for not realizing that
22	he wasn't there, but it's not my
23	responsibility to call meetings
24	when I call the head of committee
25	and he's not responding.

2	MR. MILAZZO: He may have
3	business matters. He's a
4	volunteer. I wouldn't read into
5	his inability to call back.
6	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: Very
7	quickly after our meeting, Steve
8	will testify to that, based on
9	your renovations.
10	MR. SZABO: We'll have a
11	meeting. We'll open it up to
12	other folks. It's focused on 2017
13	groundwater management plan. I'm
14	sure there will be a lot of
15	discussion. I don't think there
16	is any opposition. I've not heard
17	any opposition to including that.
18	If I think if there was, sort
19	of, a disconnection between
20	including and not including it was
21	whether it was going to be in the
22	State of the Aquifer Report, and
23	that may have been a
24	misunderstanding
25	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: No, that

3	MR. COLABUFO: Or also
4	maybe a separate report on entity,
5	management options, things like
6	that, because I had a completely
7	different idea of what education
8	and public-private partnership was
9	going to be, and I didn't think it
10	was going to be a management
11	entity. It was really going to be
12	business and water supplier
13	relationships.
14	MR. SZABO: I think that's
15	to be decided.
16	MR. KOCH: I think that's
17	why it's a work in progress.
18	MR. SZABO: You have a
19	small group that is advocating for
20	a particular entity, entity,
21	entity, but I don't think we're
22	there yet. I think this will work
23	out through discussion of the
24	larger community.
25	MS. BLUMER: I have a

2	question. Are you open today to
3	going beyond just a mere
4	discussion of entity to appointing
5	a subcommittee? You, you know
6	MR. SZABO: Again, I'm
7	confused. Is this forgive me
8	if I'm not clearly understanding
9	this, but this discussion about an
10	entity, I'm getting the impression
11	that you want that to take place
12	in the P3 category subcommittee.
13	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: No. I
14	will repeat what I said.
15	MS. BLUMER: No.
16	MR. MILAZZO: Is there a
17	consensus on your side? Is there
18	a consensus that P3 is the
19	solution?
20	MS. BLUMER: No way.
21	MR. MILAZZO: It's just a
22	conversation.
23	MS. BLUMER: P3 is one
24	little part of the water elephant,
25	one little part, and though

2	Michael White and I don't agree on
3	a whole lot of things, but he's
4	the only one at this leadership
5	table who has pointed out, Karen
6	is right. This is a government
7	situation. This is not a
8	technical we've got technical.
9	We've got regulators. No, we're
10	in a governance crisis. Nobody is
11	mentioning entity, and we can't
12	have, like, the water authority
13	here and DEC there.
14	MR. KOCH: I don't think
15	there's any facts behind that.
16	MR. SZABO: You can't
17	say
18	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: She means
19	no one group.
20	MS. BLUMER: There is no
21	one management.
22	MR. MILAZZO: State of New
23	York.
24	MS. BLUMER: I (inaudible)
25	and listen to all of you guys

2	talking, and one of the major
3	conversations at almost every
4	meeting is, We don't even have a
5	central database. We can't share
6	data. You know, come on we've
7	been
8	MR. SZABO: Karen, what are
9	you talking about, because we have
10	a central database.
11	MR. KOCH: We do.
12	MR. SZABO: For what, test
13	results?
14	MS. BLUMER: Do you have an
15	up-to-the-minute data feed that
16	includes the data from the last
17	50 years that you can actually see
18	what the aquifer looks like and
19	where water intrusion is coming in
20	and which water district actually
21	needs some help? No, you do not.
22	MR. SZABO: Who has that.
23	MS. MEYLAND: It doesn't
24	exist.
25	MS. BLUMER: We're in 2016

2	and it doesn't exist.
3	MR. SZABO: I'm sorry. I
4	thought you were talking about
5	managing or having access to data
6	through test results.
7	MR. MILAZZO: That's an
8	example, right, of a management
9	opportunity, so identify it and
10	then we can the entity LICAP
11	can act on that as part of the
12	plan, but that's a perfect example
13	of management opportunity.
14	MS. BLUMER: LICAP does not
15	have the kind of authority. We
16	need a governance body.
17	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: LICAP
18	is no one is saying
19	MR. MILAZZO: You're never
20	going to escape the circle that
21	<pre>I this is what I'm hearing:</pre>
22	LICAP can't do it because they
23	don't have the authority, but they
24	shouldn't there needs to be an
25	entity with the authority All

2	LICAP can do all LICAP can do
3	in my reading of the law is:
4	Here is things that we recommend,
5	and what I'm hearing from Jared is
6	as part of that recommendation
7	should be some P3, a P3 variant
8	that includes maybe a compact,
9	maybe a management entity.
10	That's let's agree that's all
11	LICAP can do, and what I'm also
12	hearing is
13	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: No, the
14	difference is.
15	MR. MILAZZO: Let me
16	finish. We let you finish.
17	The disagreement that
18	you're bringing to the table today
19	is we haven't had the opportunity
20	to suggest that this should be
21	part of the plan; that this is an
22	opportunity for a management
23	regime or this is an entity.
24	What you're hearing today
25	from Jeff is: Make those

2	recommendations, and they can be
3	included as part of the plan as
4	some section as management
5	opportunity. Here is an entity
6	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: I have
7	MR. MILAZZO: Again, this
8	goes in the plan, not a state of
9	the aquifer, and your hearing
10	there will be meetings on this,
11	but Karen, that's all LICAP can
12	do. LICAP will not be the entity
13	saying, This is how much water.
14	It's not going to be
15	MS. BLUMER: You're
16	absolutely right.
17	MR. MILAZZO: It doesn't
18	have the authority to do that.
19	MS. BLUMER: You couldn't
20	be more right.
21	MR. MILAZZO: First time.
22	MS. BLUMER: They're only
23	one part of this whole discussion,
24	but we're not having the
25	discussion. This kind of

2	discussion should be going on in
3	the subcommittee.
4	MR. MILAZZO: Jeff has
5	said
6	MR. KOCH: I have an issue
7	with a subcommittee on a
8	recommendation where we didn't get
9	the plan yet.
10	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: No, no,
11	you're putting the cart before the
12	horse.
13	MR. KOCH: I don't think
14	so. I think I'm put the horse
15	before the cart. What happens is
16	the ground water plan has to be
17	we're going to get a
18	recommendation. One of them will
19	be these management opportunities.
20	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: Okay. We
21	need a subcommittee to research
22	this.
23	MR. KOCH: Maybe. We're
24	going to, you know, have 10
25	recommendation, 20 recommendation.

2	Let's flesh it out first.
3	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: Flesh it
4	out in committee, not
5	MS. BLUMER: You're
6	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: That's
7	substantially structured
8	MR. KOCH: No, no, I
9	disagree. What happens is the
10	committees do single reports.
11	Together, okay
12	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: The
13	committee
14	MR. KOCH: this report
15	becomes one.
16	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: I want to
17	rephrase your words.
18	MR. KOCH: Okay. You're
19	going to hang me on a word or are
20	we going to try to get this done?
21	Is let me talk. What
22	happens is these reports come
23	together. Each report has
24	recommendations. What we're going
25	to do is have a summary of

2	recommendations. Okay, not every
3	recommendation, I believe, from
4	every report is going to be
5	recommended to the legislators.
6	It would be too cumbersome. We
7	have to give them maybe 10, maybe
8	20. We'll flesh that out and have

11	opportunity, but to have a
12	subcommittee on one possible
13	recommendation right now is
14	premature.
15	MS. BLUMER: It's not one
16	possible recommendation. This
17	conversation is going on outside
18	LICAP. LICAP is the (inaudible).
19	You aren't in the ballpark yet.
20	You missed 12 hours of hearings.
21	It's over and over there were
22	two threads: We're in crisis, and
23	it's way beyond what 50 years and
24	even the last report has done.
25	MR. KOCH: I'm sorry, what

3	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: We have
4	four minutes before the meeting
5	starts.
6	MS. BLUMER: We know what
7	the problem is. You should have
8	listened to the 12 hours. Every
9	other speaker or every speaker, we

12	The other thread that went
13	through there, which, to your
14	surprise, was entity, and we're
15	missing
16	MR. SZABO: We're not
17	surprised. We have elected
18	officials that are being asked

21	all support long-term health of
22	the aquifer, maybe no more than
23	the water providers.
24	MS. BLUMER: Those are
25	empty words.

13	MS. BLUMER: No, but that's
14	on conservation, and again,
15	conservation, you know, when one
16	side of the mouth is saying we
17	have to conserve and educate, but
18	the other one, you know, is a
19	whole different message, but
20	anyway.
21	MR. KOCH: What message,
22	and why are you vague about the
23	message?
24	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: Frank,
25	Karen, let me speak for a second.

5	We're in water crisis. We've
6	problems everywhere, and this
7	document is not conveying what
8	some of those are to the public, I
9	think, in enough urgency, and we

11	than we even anticipated. Senator
12	LaValle said we're just brushing
13	the surface.
14	The most telling thing for
15	me on Monday was USGS, Chris
16	Schubert, saying this blew me
17	away. Three years ago for the
18	Lloyd Aquifer I would have said no
19	problem, everything is great.
20	Now, recently I'm seeing some very
21	disturbing points that are of
22	great concern to me, so, you know,
23	we're we really have a crisis
24	message by a whole bevy of people
25	who spoke all day on Monday, and

2	then we have our report that I'm
3	not sure the whole tenor is quite
4	as you know, again, on one side
5	or our mouth we talk about
6	education and bringing people
7	along, you know, we've got to make
8	some changes, and then we're
9	saying everything is fine, so, you
10	know, again, that's a biggie,
11	because we've written a lot of the
12	report, but there might be some
13	few phrases that we might put this
14	more into perspective.
15	MR. SZABO: Karen, I
16	respectfully disagree with your
17	interpretation of the draft State
18	of the Aquifer Report. I think
19	the report is a fair and honest
20	description of the state of the
21	aquifer. Obviously there may be
22	disagreement between those at the
23	table and the audience, but if you
24	look through the document I think
25	it paints the picture of the

2	present state, positives and
3	negatives.
4	MR. MILAZZO: I also
5	Karen, that is why you have public
6	hearings.
7	MR. SZABO: That's a very
8	good point. This is draft. We're
9	consistent in saying that a lot of
10	work for many, many months has
11	gone into it, but specifically we
12	have not issued a final report
13	because we do want to hear from
14	folks like yourself and other
15	individuals from the public
16	representing different
17	organizations or themselves to
18	comment on the report and praise
19	us when we did something right and
20	be critical when we did something
21	wrong, so those comments will be
22	taken into consideration before
23	the final report is issued
24	hopefully by the end of the year.
25	MR CAREY: Stan Carey T

2	don't know, Karen, that labeling
3	this that it paints a rosy picture
4	is accurate, because there are
5	three pages about the Grumman
6	plume in here. There's a section
7	about pesticides. There's a
8	section about nitrates. There's a
9	section about chlorides, so I
10	don't know how you can conclude
11	that that paints a rosy picture,
12	and, in fact, the title, "Resource
13	Faces Challenges," so I don't know
14	that I agree that that's an
15	accurate statement.
16	MR. KOCH: Frank Koch. My
17	opinion on the State of the
18	Aquifer Report is it's a consensus
19	among all professionals here, so
20	there's a lot of facts in here.
21	As Stan says it states the Grumman
22	plume. It states nitrates. It
23	states pesticides. An opinion
24	like crisis is included, so that's
25	up to the individual.

3	Dawydiak. Can we set a hard
4	deadline for any final minor
5	clarifications or comments,
6	understanding
7	MR. SZABO: I think we've
8	done that three or four times.
9	MR. DAWYDIAK: It still
10	sounds to me like the door is
11	kinda, sorta open.
12	MR. SZABO: We have set,
13	and I don't want to speak for
14	Mr. Colabufo. He's pulling out
15	his hair. You know, he has set
16	deadlines, drop-dead dates, one
17	more chance, we have another week,
18	please get back to me, numerous
19	e-mails, phone calls,
20	conversations and trying his best
21	to work with the individuals here
22	to solicit comments, but I think
23	what we need to do is set a date
24	of when we want to put this on our
25	website When do we want to start

2	promoting it to the public and
3	other agencies and individuals to
4	hopefully get folks to come down
5	to the public hearings. If we set
6	that date, and if it's this Friday
7	or next Wednesday, maybe that's a
8	decision that we should make
9	today, Mr. Koch?
10	MR. KOCH: Yeah.
11	MR. SZABO: That will give
12	us time to allow Steve to get any
13	comments you may have, make some
1.4	changes, assuming it's the
15	consensus of the commission
16	members, revise the document and
17	post it, but I truly believe we
18	only have a few days left.
19	MR. KOCH: Yeah. Frank
20	Koch. I believe there's only one
21	more conversation left between
22	Sarah and Steve, and I think we
23	can then right after that, so
24	let's give it until Friday, if
25	that's enough for Steve, unless

2	Steve says, you know, hey.
3	MR. COLABUFO: Friday is
4	fine.
5	MR. SZABO: Does everyone
6	feel Friday is appropriate?
7	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: Yeah.

9	the report is still a draft, and
10	it's going to the public hearing
11	as a draft
12	MR. SZABO: Correct.
13	MR. IRWIN: so
14	additional changes the committee
15	wants to make can be done after
16	the public hearings.
17	MR. SZABO: Absolutely.
18	MR. KOCH: For website
19	purposes.
20	Now we go to the status of
21	the subcommittee reports. I guess
22	that's Steve. Thank you, Steve.
23	MR. COLABUFO: Okay, as
24	part of the Groundwater Management
25	Plan, as you know, there's 16 or

2	so reports that are going to be,
3	sort of, the chapters within the
4	Groundwater Management Plan, and I
5	will go, kind of, groupings by
6	progress. There's four of the
7	reports that were considered
8	finalized: Climate change impacts
9	to the water supply, one on pine
10	barrens role in the water supply
11	and land preservation and another
12	one on the water efficiency and
13	value of water, which included a
14	section on gray water irrigation
15	that John Turner contributed.
16	We've got a couple that
17	the final draft is right around
18	the corner, but it's been a good
19	month or two months where I'm
20	waiting for the final draft, even
21	though almost all of the
22	preliminary work has been done.
23	That includes work on chloride
24	contamination, a report on
25	geothermal systems by John Ryan

2	and Paul Boyce of PW Grosser.
3	There's another one on crosscounty
4	water transmission. We're close
5	to that one as well, and then the
6	regulatory report that Paul
7	Ponturo is working on. I meant to
8	get in touch with him over the
9	last week. I haven't been able
10	to, but all those four reports are
11	close to being a final draft.
12	When it gets to final draft
13	point it will go out to the entire
14	subcommittee for comment.
15	I'm going to have to start
16	getting aggressive with deadlines,
17	like two weeks max and then drop
18	dead. That's it, because we've
19	been, kind of, going on with this
20	revolving door policy. That can't
21	happen.
22	There's a couple reports
23	that the first draft has been
24	done
25	MR. SZABO: Not to

1	Proceedings
2	interrupt, but to clarify for
3	those in the audience, we're
4	talking about the 2017 Groundwater
5	Management Plan not the State of
6	the Aquifer Report. I hope
7	everyone understands, as far as
8	updates and comments and
9	subcommittee work.
10	MR. COLABUFO: Right.
11	A couple reports have a
12	first draft that is done, and the
13	report is in progress but has, I
14	guess, let's say, issues
15	associated with it. Regional
16	contamination events, water
17	quantity and competing uses that
18	Sarah is doing, as well as the
19	aquifer report that Mike Alatare
20	(phonetic) is working on, and then
21	everyone's favorite, the education
22	and public-private partnerships.
23	They have significant the last
24	three have issues that have to be
25	mitigated first before the report

1	Proceedings
2	can progress past the first draft.
3	Then another report that
4	myself and Rich Goldrich started
5	working on over the last couple
6	weeks is on water supply
7	alternatives. We didn't have a
8	specific person who could write a
9	report based on their actual work,
10	so we made it more of a research
11	type of report. I did manage to
12	get three specific examples.
13	Water supply alternatives includes
14	things like desalination, aquifer
15	storage and recovery and
16	nonpotable water reuse. Rich Bove
17	(phonetic) and I drafted a report,
18	prototype, let's call it, not even
19	a first draft, a prototype of the
20	report that includes those items,
21	and I got three examples of each
22	of those, aquifer storage and
23	recovery, desalination and
24	nonpotable water reuse from some
25	contacts I had on the west coast

1	Proceedings
2	and the Sustainable Water
3	Management Congress they attended
4	last March. That's an interesting
5	paper on those.
6	What we'll be doing in the
7	next couple weeks is starting that
8	from the beginning. We're going
9	to send out an e-mail with the
10	prototype of the report. Let's
11	get a group together and start.
12	At least you're not starting from
13	square one. You're starting from
14	square two or three, because we
15	have a prototype of report.
16	Then there's been minimal
17	to no progress on a couple of
18	reports: Wastewater management,
19	Steve Fangmann with D&B was going
20	to be working on that, but it
21	hasn't quite panned out, and New
22	York City well reopening report we
23	spoke to or e-mailed you on that,
24	and we just kind of
25	MR SCHNEIDER. We started

2	the original draft, and I'll have
3	the final draft by the end of the
4	week. We're working on some
5	figures.
6	MR. COLABUFO: Awesome.
7	Thank you.
8	As I said, so that's the
9	status of all the reports.
10	MR. KOCH: Jared has a
11	question.
12	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: Steve, I
13	just want to remind you of
14	something that Jeff said, I think
15	it was well over a year ago, and
16	that's that, because it's a
17	management plan, that each of
18	these reports should have attached
19	to them, either within the report
20	itself or we actually talked about
21	having a section at the end of the
22	management plan, where each
23	plan each report has something
24	actionable attached to it; that
25	there are recommendations that are

2	going to be made, so the two
3	different ways we talked about
4	doing that would be to attach
5	these recommendations in the
6	individual reports or to have a
7	section in the management plan
8	with recommendations added on, and
9	that needs to be fleshed out
10	within the LICAP committee
11	totally, so my thoughts to you
12	were to remind you, John, that
13	do you have some suggestions
14	relative to your report as to what
15	can be done to mitigate the
16	problem?
17	MR. COLABUFO: As we
18	progress through the report
19	process, hopefully that will come
20	out. I'd like to get all the
21	reports, if possible, by the end
22	of this year. I don't know if we
23	can maintain that. (Inaudible)
24	I'd like to be able to do that and
25	spend the first quarter next year

2	just putting the entire plan
3	together, but we have got to have
4	these reports in, so deadlines are
5	going to start getting shorter,
6	and I'm going to start getting
7	more annoying to people as we
8	progress through this, because
9	we're at that point.
10	MS. MEYLAND: Sarah
11	Meyland. I have a question. I
12	don't think we've gone into the
13	details of this, but once the
14	individual reports are prepared,
15	then and they're reviewed by
16	the whole LICAP committee, is
17	there going to be a rewrite of the
18	reports to put them in some kind
19	of very consistent format?
20	MR. COLABUFO: Yes.
21	MS. MEYLAND: There's still
22	going to be A revision process
23	after the drafts are prepared?
24	MR. COLABUFO: After we get
25	a final draft that comes to a

1	Proceedings
2	consensus that the report writing
3	groups as well as subcommittees
4	agree on, this is what the report
5	should look like. They're going
6	to try to keep the format as
7	consistent as possible. I'd like
8	to have each report be able to
9	function as a stand-alone
10	document. If somebody's
11	interested in water supply
12	alternatives, they could actually,
13	in theory, photocopy that and it
14	would be a self-contained
15	document, but it fits as a
16	chapter. I can keep font
17	consistent and pictures and things
18	like that.
19	I told some authors that
20	each report should have a table of
21	contents and abstract on the first
22	page, and it should have an
23	introduction, a body,
24	recommendations and conclusions at
25	the end, so I'm trying to stay

2	with that, and even the font
3	itself, Arial 10 point font, you
4	can squeeze a lot of information
5	to one page with that font, so
6	I've said that, and that's my
7	intent, to have it as a cohesive
8	unit, but within that each report
9	could be its own stand-alone
10	document with references and
11	things like that.
12	MS. MEYLAND: You do want
13	references list of each chapter?
14	MR. COLABUFO: Yes,
15	absolutely.
16	MR. KOCH: Frank Koch. The
17	wastewater management is Brian
18	Schneider, making a nice comeback
19	with New York City well opening,
20	is it something where we should
21	try to at least help him out with?
22	Should we get volunteers.
23	MR. COLABUFO: Bill can
24	probably speak to that. He's been
25	trying to shepherd this report.

4	right now are preventing from
5	being able to find time, so we
6	need to find author.
7	MR. KOCH: Really we need
8	to find a wastewater engineer, I

12	there.
13	MR. COLABUFO: And we're
14	kind of at the 11th hour, or at
15	least the 10th hour. We have to
16	get this going soon and finished
17	soon.
18	MR. KOCH: Okay. Brian?
19	MR. SCHNEIDER: Brian
20	Schneider. Steve, I just wanted
21	to I think we had this
22	conversation on the phone about
23	the regional groundwater
24	contamination chapter. Basically
25	the authors right now are myself,

3	Mike Flaherty. It's a very
4	significant Nassau flavor to the
5	report. We don't have anybody
6	from Suffolk at this point to
7	contribute to the groundwater
8	contamination issues specific to
9	Suffolk County, like (inaudible)
10	and Brookhaven National Lab, so we
11	need someone from Suffolk to
12	inject the Suffolk piece, because
13	right now we're at 13 pages just
14	for Nassau alone, so we're trying
15	to pare that down. I don't think
16	we need to get into great detail,
17	as far as the operable units
18	proposed.
19	MR. COLABUFO: No.
20	MR. SCHNEIDER: I think we
21	need to reference a lot of
22	existing information on how those
23	plumes are being addressed or not
24	being addressed, and we need a
25	Suffolk County piece at this point

2	so we can forward the first draft
3	to you.
4	MR. COLABUFO: Sure.
5	MR. SCHNEIDER: Again, we
6	need someone from Suffolk County
7	to injection the information for
8	Suffolk County.

11	MR. DAWYDIAK: We're happy
12	to help, and our comp plan has got
13	a lot of the pieces that we would
14	need to feed into this. I think
15	we have a piece of the puzzle and

18	somebody on Carrie's staff to help
19	round this out also, but we're
20	happy to help. We have a few
21	micros we can tap.

23	best thing would be to forward the
24	first draft to Steve and send it

21	out maybe to Karen for the Water
22	Forum or any other umbrella groups

12	That's one way to do it,
13	obviously, on our own website, of
14	course, but maybe we can work with
15	the Newsday people, get a free
16	thing put in pro bono or mention

18	(inaudible) News 12. Try and
19	mitigate problems that we had last
20	time with getting out to the
21	public, just a couple
22	opportunities.
23	MR. KOCH: We have a press
24	conference on WaterTraq Friday. I
25	guess we could highlight the

3	MR. SZABO: This Friday at
4	11:00 here in this room, and LICAP
5	commission members are welcome to
6	attend, Stan, Frank, myself, Ty
7	will be officially kicking off the
8	WaterTraq program, going live with
9	it. It's something that we've all
10	seen demonstrations of, and
11	certainly Mr. Fuller has had a
12	road show the last six months
13	going and meeting with different
14	organizations and community groups
15	and elected officials and
16	regulators, but as everyone knows,
17	WaterTraq will allow for the
18	first time in New York State
19	history, will give residents and
20	customers and regulators the
21	ability to look up and go online
22	using GIS information and testing
23	result data provided by the water
24	suppliers and search for
25	contaminants and type in an

2	address and look at the water
3	they're getting in their
4	particular home before it's
5	treated and also posttreatment, so
6	it's a valuable tool for the
7	industry and for DEC and the
8	health department to paint a
9	picture of the Island as a whole,
10	at least Nassau and Suffolk
11	County, when it comes to water
12	quality, but this WaterTraq that
13	Ty Fuller developed is a
14	tremendous success and outgrowth
15	of the work of this commission.
16	It's going live, and everyone,
17	residents and people from the
18	homes, will be able to use this
19	tool.
20	I apologize to
21	Mr. Dawydiak, because there may be
22	additional calls, numerous calls
23	in the health department with
24	particular questions, but it's all
25	for the greater good, and I'm

2	certainly sure some of the
3	suppliers too will get questions,
4	but that's a good thing. That's a
5	good thing. Every time we get an
6	opportunity to engage and explain
7	what people are drinking or the
8	water that they have pretreatment,
9	I think that's an opportunity to
10	engage the public, so that's 11:00
11	here Friday morning. You're
12	welcome to attend. Hopefully we
13	will have Newsday ran a story
14	several months ago, but we're
15	hoping there is other media,
16	whether FiOS or News 12 and some
17	other publications, that will be
18	here to join us, and I think,
19	hopefully, Carrie Gallagher from
20	the DEC would join us. We should
21	take a lot of pride and joy that
22	we're finally going live with it.
23	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: What
24	you're saying is that you will
25	announce the public hearings at

3	MR. SZABO: We will promote
4	them.
5	MR. CAREY: Stan Carey.
6	Just as a point of reference for
7	our health department members,
8	several of us, Ty, myself and
9	Jason Hein from Suffolk County
10	Health, we went and met with State
11	Health in July in New Rochelle.
12	Ty made a great presentation.
13	They were fine with the level of
14	detail on WaterTraq. They did
15	make a couple suggestions which we
16	did Ty did accommodate, so I
17	got a call last week or the week
18	before. They're not going to give
19	us an official endorsement in
20	writing, but they gave it to me
21	verbally that it's okay to go
22	live.
23	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: We were
24	going to go to Homeland Security
25	also to check that Did we do

3	MR. MILAZZO: DOH was the
4	one.
5	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: They
6	speak for Homeland Security.
7	MR. MILAZZO: They were the
8	State Homeland Security issues.
9	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: We
10	covered that? I wanted to make
11	sure, because that was a big
12	concern we had.
13	MR. MILAZZO: That was
14	DOH's concern.
15	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: In terms
16	of the how we're going to
17	identify and reach out, are you
18	going to take charge of that,
19	Frank, as commissioner, in terms
20	of where to send the press
21	releases and plan?
22	MR. KOCH: Well, we will
23	try to send press releases
24	where we can, so I Newsday
25	doesn't do anything for free.

3	understand, but in terms of the
4	environmental umbrella groups, car
5	we reach out.
6	MR. KOCH: If someone can
7	give me a list, that would be

11	at the William J. Lindsay County
12	Complex here in Hauppauge. It's,
13	as I said, 6:00 p.m. That's the
14	first hearing. October 17th, 6:00

18	County headquarters of the
19	Nassau County legislature.

13	invite, maybe by Friday or by very
14	early next week, maybe send them
15	to Frank, Stan and I, we will then
16	try to put together a
17	comprehensive list as possible.
18	We will then put out a notice and
19	encourage folks to attend.
20	Newsday, I believe, had
21	something, a small column
22	promoting the assembly and senate
23	water quality hearing. They may
24	have interest in this. They may
25	promote it just as a little blurb

3	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: News 12
4	has the same thing.
5	MR. SZABO: We can
6	certainly reach out to them.

11	our customers, break it down by
12	geography, western Suffolk? I'm
13	not opposed to doing that. We
14	will invite elected officials in
15	both counties, certainly members
16	of the legislature and members of
17	the County and State legislature.
18	If there is prepared comments or
19	we have speakers who wish to have
20	time to address the committee,
21	whether it's individuals or
22	somebody in an official capacity,
23	they should probably reach out and
24	coordinate so we can do something
25	like the State did where you go up

3	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: Limit it
4	to three minutes.
5	MR. SZABO: Those types of
6	requirements and making sure that
7	if somebody wants to speak they

13	communications people. We have
14	some folks on our staff and, I

16	Conference, they utilize Zimmerman

22	all matters? The goal here is to

5	MR. MILAZZO: Wait, whoa.
6	MR. KOCH: September 26th,
7	the water conference, there is a
8	cost, \$75. It's a dinner.
9	Actually, you need to be a member
10	MR. MILAZZO: That's not
11	open to the public.
12	MR. SZABO: Could you state
13	your name, please? Who asked that
14	question?
15	MS. DeANGELO: Sandra
16	DeAngelo, Restoration Advisory
17	Board.
18	MR. KOCH: Can we conclude
19	Section 5 and move on? Any other
20	questions?
21	Okay, number 6, discussion
22	related to future management
23	opportunities. That has been
24	asked to have a subcommittee to
25	look into future management

3	mean by "future management
4	opportunities," as Jeff explained
5	to me, because I didn't know what
6	it meant exactly, it could be
7	anything, okay, so do we have
8	anybody interested in chairing a

12	MS. GALLAGHER: It doesn't
13	have to be an entity.
14	MR. MILAZZO: It's an
15	opportunity.
16	MS. GALLAGHER: One of the
17	opportunities.
18	MR. HERSHKOWITZ: Exactly,
19	the choices.
20	MR. MILAZZO: Do you want
21	to make a committee so let me
22	just go through there's options
23	here. There's options in all
24	these things. One of the options
25	is that the chairperson can create

3	appoint the chairperson, and then
4	that committee would meet. They
5	would develop consensus and make a
6	recommendation for consideration
7	by the members of LICAP
8	commission. That's redundant
9	because LICAP commission is a
10	commission. That would be
11	consideration for the LICAP to
12	decide what recommendations to
13	include. This is all related to
14	the Groundwater Management Plan.
15	That's why to now this is this
16	is when it's appropriate, because
17	it's not part of a (inaudible), so
18	you can, as chairman's
19	prerogative, say this is going
20	I establish a commission. I
21	appoint three people, five people,
22	and here are the members, and you
23	can appoint them, or you can
24	stay open up for a
25	conversation. The key here is to

3	opportunities so that the
4	commission can consider them and
5	include them in the plan as
6	appropriate, recognizing that
7	consensus at the committee level
8	and then consensus at the
9	commission level, and then it gets

14	been seeking for a long time, and
15	now it's the time to have the
16	conversation.

23	commissions giving kudos to the
24	leadership here because, you

10	Again, Karen, no one is going to
11	be excluded from this

21	Everyone is welcome. I think we

12	that was discussed, not every
13	possible management opportunity
14	may be included in that
15	recommendation. If there is some
16	disagreement, if there are folks

21	suggest that that matter come to
22	the full LICAP commission and be
23	bought to a vote.

12	another two years before we get
13	all this information back and will
14	have raw data, but that's also
15	going to be available to everyone
16	and I wanted to keep everyone
17	informed on that one as we're
18	pretty excited about that project.
19	MR. KOCH: Pulling water
20	from a well 500 feet down at
21	certain latitude and longitude?
22	MS. FISHER: Yes, so we're
23	using this project, and we also
24	did some age dating back in 2012
25	for another project that looked

4	coastal aquifer, so we're using
5	that age dating and these wells
